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Administration says no to cat picture

Brexit's process has been slowed down

Brexit is a word used as a short way of saying the United Kingdom leaving the European Union. A vote was held on Thursday, June 23, 2016, by former Prime Minister David Cameron, to decide whether the UK should leave or remain in the EU. Leave won by 51.9% to 48.1%.

England and Wales both voted for Brexit. Scotland and Northern Ireland both voted to remain in the EU. For the UK to leave the EU it had to invoke Article 50 of the Lisbon Treaty which gives the two sides two years to agree on the terms of the separation. Theresa May, the current prime minister of the UK, triggered this process on March 29, 2017, meaning the UK is scheduled to leave the EU at 11 pm UK time on Friday, March 29, 2019.

Brexit has many pros and cons. One of the pros is that leaving the EU would result in an immediate cost saving; they would no longer contribute to the EU budget. However, there are no taxes on imports and exports in the EU so the UK would also lose money by having to pay those taxes.

For Leavers, exiting the EU will allow Britain to re-establish itself as a truly independent nation with connections to the rest of the world. For Remainers, it will result in the country giving up its influence in Europe.

Also, pro-Brexit people criticized the UK's "open door" policy. Most countries in the EU have "no-border," meaning when you drive into another country, you don't necessarily need to show your papers. So the view is that staying in the EU will lead to terrorist attacks because this border does not allow to check and control people. But others replied that the EU was very important for the security of the country, especially at a time of instability in the Middle East, because there is power in number.

Theresa May wants the Parliament to approve the deal she has created for the UK to leave the European Union. Her agreement sets out what will happen when the UK leaves the EU on March 29, 2019. It covers issues like how much they are going to pay to the EU, what will happen to UK citizens living elsewhere and what will happen to EU citizens living in the UK.

One of the sticking points has been the border between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. Splitting the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland with a hard border it will make crossing into Northern Ireland (or vice-versa) hard for the people living there, who may cross the border often to go to work or even to see family.

On January 15th, Britain's parliament rejected Theresa May's Brexit deal. Parliament voted 432 to 202 against May's plan. With a deal that took nearly two years to create, European Union leaders sounded a note of exasperation, urging Britain to come out and say what it actually wants, the deadline is in less than 2 months.

Students Proving Citizenship

The 2018 South Dakota election yielded some new faces in state offices and with that comes new policies. The current South Dakota offices are filled by John Thune and Mike Rounds as senators, Dusty Johnson as the state representative, and Kristi Noem at governor. Just this last month, Kristi Noem gave her thoughts on the state's proceedings in the state of the state address where she talked largely about drugs and education. The new governor Kristi Noem has had a few propositions that would affect high school students. One idea governor Noem has had is a measure that would require all high school students in South Dakota to score a 70 percent or above on a civics test in order to receive a diploma. Ryan Beckler, a freshman at Highmore-Harrold said, "The citizenship test is easy enough so I don't really care if we have to take it."

Civics is the studies of the rights and responsibilities of the citizens in a place. A civics test would show that students know enough about the United States to exercise these rights and responsibilities properly. Colby Werdel, a sophomore at Highmore-Harrold commented, "I don't really think a citizenship test is worthwhile in South Dakota." Noem, who made education a strong point in her state of the state address believes that it is only fair that high school students have basic knowledge of our country's history and practices. On top of a citizenship test, Noem said she would like to see more experience and less classroom time in schools. She thinks that the best way for South Dakota students to learn an industry is by experience. These are just propositions, but the South Dakota state legislature has also been considering similar measures.

Senate Bill 49 - what is it?

Senate Bill 49 is a transgender policy for high school athletics in South Dakota. It states that students who are transgender must participate in high school sports according to their sex at birth rather than how they identify themselves.

In 2015, the SDHSAA adopted the policy that high school athletes participated in sports for the gender they identify themselves as. With that policy, a person born as a female could participate in a male's sports. Senate Bill 49 would ensure a person born as a female would participate in female sports. Why is it needed? It is needed to help make competition among sports fairer for the competitors. Grady Aasby states, "I think it's a great rule because God gave you a body to act like a boy/girl so they should participate in the gender group they were born as."

The American Civil Liberties Union of South Dakota and other transgender rights groups opposed Bill 49. Many people think this new bill will discriminate transgender students. State Senator Jim Bolin says that the bill is strictly for fairness in sports, not about locker rooms. The South Dakota Senate Education Committee killed the bill with a 5-2 vote. Therefore, students can participate in sports for the gender they identify themselves as. "I feel that it was unnecessary and to let the schools decide," stated Mark Hague.

Legislators continue to try to make new policies to have students participate in their original gender sports. Now, House Bill 1225 has been introduced and it states that student's participating in high school sports must be on teams of the sex on their birth certificate.
